The Lord wasn't going to allow me to shelve the idea. In August of 2020, I felt with a sense of urgency the call to sell my house in preparation of my pending career change. I called a realtor and signed a seller's contract that same day. The Lord continued to guide me every step of the way. My home sold within a few weeks, the law firm cheered me on as I parted ways, and the perfect replacement stepped in for me at the Hub City Mission. And, of course, I did get offered the Director position at LCGM. The Lord aligned everything to fall neatly in place and I just felt peace that this was His will for my life.

I must say that each time I enter this simple red building, I immediately feel at home. It is my hope that every single person that enters our doors will feel the same way. Home should be where we feel safe, where we find food and clothing, and where we feel accepted and loved. Thank you to all who serve, donate and pray for LCGM. CINDY'S STORY A LIFE REDEEMED

Growing up, my life was surrounded by addiction and chaos. I lived back and forth between my father, who was an alcoholic, and my mother, who I had a strained relationship with. At age 10, I started following in my father's footsteps and I took up drinking and smoking cigarettes. The alcohol made me forget the pain and I wanted to continue chasing that feeling. My life changed for the worse the day that I was introduced to meth. I had no idea that it would claim the next 25 years of my life.

Meth completely took hold of and consumed me. It devastated all my relationships, including my family, and I found myself homeless for nearly 12 years. At my lowest point, I lived in a tent at the side of the road. I did not have one single friend. My spirit was completely crushed and I didn't think I had any future. I didn't even feel worthy of being alive.

That all changed the day I met a man named Lenny. He was the neighbor of a lady that I would often use drugs with. He befriended me and invited me to go to church with him. I followed him to church, even though I had been high at the time. I had always believed in God, but I had never felt like I could have a relationship with Him. I felt for sure that God couldn't love someone like me.

I am so grateful for all the people who kept telling me that I was worthy of His love. It was the kind-hearted volunteers at the missions that I frequented, including the Gather, Hub City Mission, and the Lewis County Gospel Mission, that made me feel like I was a real person. And of course, my friend Lenny, who believed in me and dared to invite a woman like me to church with him.

I will never forget the day that God healed me of my meth and alcohol addiction. I was completely broken and didn't want this kind of life anymore. I cried out to God and begged for him to take the addiction from me. By the next week I could not use any more and felt that I no longer wanted to. Not even cigarettes. The Lord had answered by prayer and had finally set me free!
